By the time you're reading this message,







Completion of this course will allow you to order the product from authorized distributors. This session, which is authorized by Merck, is not accredited for continuing education credit. The training is open only to advanced practice clinicians with furnishing numbers or prescribing privileges in their state. It is Merck's policy to verify all clinicians' practice, license, and eligibility information in advance of training. Merck will contact you directly if there is a problem. Participants are expected to attend the entire training session, which is approximately 3 hours in duration. Certificates of attendance will not be issued for persons who arrive late or leave early. 5. Reproductive Healthcare Coding Workshop 3.0 CE Michael S. Policar, MD, MPH

Accurate CPT and ICD coding is critical for women's health care clinicians, not only for being paid appropriately, but also to meet compliance expectations of payers. This session will begin with the fundamentals of E/M and CPT coding for office visits, followed by a case study format to provide examples of the most common coding dilemmas faced by clinicians. Special emphasis will be placed on coding considerations for services provided by nurse practitioners, CNMs and physician assistants, as well as accurate coding for common office surgical procedures. The differences between ICD-9 and ICD-10 will be reviewed and office coding work aids will be provided.

6. Clinical Breast Examination

This hands-on workshop will focus on the critical elements of the Clinical Breast Examination to maximize the possibility of discovering abnormal tissue if present. Ample time is provided for active practice on models with personalized feedback to improve skills. *Limited to 30 registered attendees.*
